

Letter from Vanessa

Dear Friends

I wonder when the last time was that you felt excluded from something? We are human beings, designed by God for relationship and connection, but we are also all broken humans - so inevitably we are going to misalign those connections sometimes! It happens to us all from time to time.

But churches are places where being excluded can feel particularly hard. Perhaps because faith is so intrinsic to our self identity - it is absolutely at the core of who we are. As Christians, we naturally want to show the love and compassion of God to everyone we meet, but sometimes we are all products of our traditions, our theological stance, or our cultural awareness. Over the centuries, many people have been excluded from the church for the colour of their skin, their gender, or their sexuality. People with disabilities have often been physically unable to get into the church. Single parents have felt frowned upon, parents of noisy children have been tutted at, those struggling with their mental health have found it hard to find a place of compassion.

We all want to welcome all who want to come to church. But we need to be honest and acknowledge that we don't always get it right! As a leadership team across our Benefice, we are working on a number of different areas of inclusion and welcome, and we would very much value your thoughts. We are working on accessible entrances at St Mark's, and also thinking about the welcome we give to LBGTQ+ people – look out for a survey coming soon in

the newsletter! Please do get in touch and let us know your feelings about inclusion in our churches!

ARTHUR CONAN DOYLE AND MINSTEAD CHURCH By Alan Edwards

few days ago, we enjoyed a delightful day at Minstead. The day had much to commend it. We met two other couples whom we first met 56 years ago. It has been the most enduring of friendships. We ate in The Trusty Servant, which possesses one of the most distinctive of pub signs: a copy of a picture in Winchester



College showing a man with a pig's snout, the ears of an ass and the feet of a stag. The pub is adjacent to a thriving community shop, opposite a small green on which is located some stocks, in which those unfortunate enough to be sentenced to a session there either were required to sit down, which looked so uncomfortable, or stand in a more conventional position. It did not require much imagination to see the poor man being pelted with gooey substances. In the front garden of a house overlooking the side of the pub was a glorious acacia in its full yellow flowering bloom. Two ponies wandered by. It was an archetypal New Forest scene.



The village church, All Saints, was a few yards up the hill. As most will know, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle is buried in the churchyard. We last visited many moons ago, when his grave/headstone was located in a fairly isolated position at the rear. This is no longer the case. It is now surrounded by many other graves. When he died in 1930, Conan Doyle was buried in the garden of his home, Windlesham, near Crowborough in East

Sussex. He was not a Christian, but a Spiritualist. He had bought a house in Minstead in 1925. Hence when his second wife, Lady Jean, and family later wanted him to be buried in the Minstead churchyard, the necessary approvals could not be obtained; another factor was that the timing coincided with the start of WW2.

When permission was eventually granted, his second and final resting place was placed away from others in the graveyard in order to avoid any local sensitivities about his religion. There appears to be no foundation to the oft quoted supposition that he was originally buried upright and bricked in a wall.



The church itself has many unusual features, both internally and externally. The facia resembles a country cottage. Inside, there is a three decker pulpit dating from the 17th century. The font is thought to be of early Norman origin. It disappeared for some time, thought to be buried for safety during the Cromwellian era. It was discovered by a gardener at the Old Rectory in the late 19th century, and restored to the church. There are also a variety of box pews, originally built for private use. There is also a grand lychgate, for which funds are being raised to replace the huge oak base plates. The church is steeped in history.

Minstead appears to be a thriving community. As we approached the door, we heard voices. Should we enter? We did so, to find the parishioners clearing up after an afternoon tea. They welcomed us warmly, and were pleased to show us around and answer questions about the church and Conan Doyle. It was a fitting end to an interesting day.

Sir Arthur had other Hampshire connections, particularly in the Portsmouth area. Some 140 years on, he remains a legendary figure in the city. As, though to a lesser extent, does Dr. Watson. More next month.

Our original game plan for the March working party was to light a bonfire and burn all the rhododendron arisings that had been accumulated over the winter. As it happened,

events on the day conspired against us. The rain from the previous few days had successfully soaked all the stuff we were planning to burn, added to which, our numbers for the work party were much depleted.



We decided the best course of action was to cut up the available bonfire material into smaller pieces, which would be easier to burn and would make life easier for ourselves when conditions improved. Although there was a lot of vegetation to be sorted out, in practice it did not take us too long, and we could begin to think about cutting back some the rhodo that was beginning to regrow

in the area below the steps. This could also be burnt next time.

It is pleasing to report the upheavals experienced in burial ground over the past year have now nearly come to an end. Our contractors have been working extremely hard and have now finished replanting the cruciform with yew, which has been encased in a wire frame for protection. The whole operation has taken over a year, for one reason or another, but the result has been worth the trouble.

In addition to the replanting, our contractors have also made considerable progress with the plan to enlarge the burial ground. The area that had been cleared has now been graded and prepared, prior to sowing grass seed over the next month or so. This essential work has very materially increased

the available size of the burial area, which should now be able to accommodate local demand for years to come.

If you fancy the idea of joining some like-minded neighbours for a few hours once a month, just turn up in the St. Mark's car park at 09:45 on the

second Saturday of every month. The Friends are a good bunch. Tools are provided. It is a good way to have a bit of fun and help our community at the same time!

Safeguarding, Sun and a Special Sunday!

On Saturday 29th March Vanessa, Ann, Jonathan and members of all the PCCs in the benefice met in St Mark's Room. As the Benefice Safeguarding Officer (BSO) I had invited people to join together to discuss how we can ensure our churches create a safe and healthy culture, and how we can support those who could be more vulnerable to abuse, and support those who are survivors of abuse. These are not always easy conversations, but they are very important in fulfilling our duty to those who need our help and support; in meeting the high safeguarding standards which the church expects, and, most importantly, in putting God at the centre of looking after ourselves and others.

As always, the PCCs didn't let me down. There was a great turn out and some interesting discussions, from which we can define actions to improve our church cultures, so that the churches are seen as welcoming, safe and inclusive spaces. Although this was a requirement from the Diocese, I have also received a number of lovely thank you messages, and people telling me how much they enjoyed the interactions. My sincere thanks to the clergy team and PCC members, without whom I couldn't do the safeguarding work that my role entails.

The date and time of our meeting just happened to coincide with the partial eclipse of the sun, so during our coffee break, François, from St Denys, led us into the beautiful glade, outside the room, in the sunshine and with clear blue skies, to experience the partial eclipse. He provided special glasses so we could look directly at the sun and cards to see the reflection of the partial eclipse; it was really exciting to see the shadow of the moon across the sun. As if that wasn't enough to pack into a morning, during coffee break, and before and after the safeguarding discussions, we helped make the posies of flowers, ready for the Mothering Sunday services, in our churches across the benefice.

Finally, Helen, from St Denys, brought cakes left over from her grandson's cake sale, which he held to raise desperately needed funds for

Join us for the next Forest Church which will take place on Sunday 18th May when the theme will be 'Musical Forest'.




Please help to save our footpaths

The traditional footpath from Knapp Lane to St Mark's Church is under threat of closure. The owners of the wood have refused to dedicate this path as a definitive right of way and for a short time the contract of the contr

it was opened by local people who believe that after continuous use for many years, there is a presumed right of way under the Highways Act.

The Parish Council supports this application and Hampshire County Council has agreed to progress an application for this and other

paths in Ampfield Woods to be added to the definitive map.



All the paths have been surveyed and a map is being prepared showing the individual paths to be claimed. New claim forms will have to be submitted for each path. The persons who have already submitted forms will be contacted again.

We do however need more evidence to show that the public have been using the paths as of right for a period of not less than twenty years (although persons providing evidence do not themselves have to prove they

used the path for that length of time - any period of time is relevant).

Spring had definitely arrived at the March Meeting of the Ampfield Parish Council when the Chairman, Miss J M Cornwell, reported on the many planting schemes which had taken place in the village over recent weeks.

The oak tree that was donated to the Parish Council for Test Valley in Bloom Tree Planting Week was planted on 24th February, in Hook Road, to reinforce the existing tree line.

Councillor Mrs P Harris organised the Ampfield Countryside Heritage Area's roadside planting of wild flowers by the Potters Heron and in Pound Lane on Saturday 13th March. The response for volunteers was very good on a lovely sunny morning for the planting of several thousand seedlings.

Also, under the direction of the Council's Tree Warden Mr B Permain, a new hedge line comprising some 300 plants covering eight different species has been planted on the boundary of Ampfield School abutting the A31. All the work was carried out by volunteer labour with grants from the Parish Council, Test Valley Borough Council, Ampfield Conservation Trust and plant contributions from Hilliers Nurseries.

Councillors were very pleased to hear of the proposed introduction of a 40 mph speed limit for part of Hook Road, but were disappointed that their wish for the extension of the speed limit throughout the whole length of the road had not been met, leaving the most vulnerable section, namely the two bends at the vicinity of Hookwood Lane, totally without restriction. Hampshire County Council does not believe a speed limit would necessarily solve the difficulties experienced in this area but have arranged for an accident study to be carried out.

The poor condition of Green Lane was brought to the attention of the Council. It was agreed to investigate what could be done to repair the damage caused mostly by the motor vehicle, and to try and find a long term solution to this on-going problem that affects single track country lanes.

A new oak seat has now been made by local craftsman, Mr G Garner, to replace the Coronation seat that was stolen from Ampfield Churchyard last July. The seat will be installed as soon as a new base has been prepared.

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 17th May 1993 in the W.I. Hall at 7.00 pm
