## Letter from Vanessa Dear Friends

"There are more things in Heaven and Earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy."

This is my last letter in the Messenger, before I depart for pastures new, and I wanted to leave you with this quote from Shakespeare. It's one of my most favourite quotes. Shakespeare had insights far beyond those of his contemporaries: he understood that the knowledge about the world that scientists and explorers had discovered, was only the beginning of what there was to know. What was true in 1603 is still true today in 2025. We are only just touching any understanding of our beautiful created world, who we are as human beings, and how we live compassionately with each other and the planet.

As I write this, I have had 24 hours of wonderful experiences in St Mark's Church. Last night was a concert given by the folk band Beggars Belief – lively and fun but with an edge to make us think! It was great to see people filling the church, and coming together as a community to raise money to make St Mark's 'step free' and enable our building to become accessible and inclusive.

This morning there was an intimate gathering of woman who drank the medicinal raw chocolate drink Cacao and were led through a nature meditation that helped us to think about self-compassion. It's only by understanding ourselves that we can, in turn understand others and reach out in compassion towards them. As Jesus pointed out – love your neighbour as yourself.

Neither of these events was 'religious' or even 'Anglican'. And yet, God was present throughout both. God is totally invested in relational community, in compassion, in inclusivity, in who we are as human beings and how we can better live together. Because at the heart of those things is love, the love that meant Christ came to earth as the incarnated God. My prayer for you all is that St Mark's can continue to be a beacon of hope and love in the Ampfield community and beyond. My prayer is that anyone and everyone will feel they can join in and find their home – regardless of where they might be on their faith journey. There are more things in heaven

and earth than religion and Anglicanism – and that mystery is God's gift to each one of us.

#### A tribute to Vanessa

We have been so incredibly lucky to have had Vanessa as our Vicar since she came to us three and a half years ago. At the time we were finding our feet after Covid which had caused great disruption and fragmentation in our Benefice and community.

Vanessa had lived in the parish and been previously involved with the Ministry Team for 13 years. Working tirelessly for all the churches, she has inspired us, brought the Benefice together, and helped us forge our new identity as a single, well-aligned parish. Vanessa re-introduced weekly services to St. Marks after Covid which helped us become a closer and even friendlier congregation. She also introduced Tidy Church which became Café Church. Vanessa has led us into becoming an Inclusive Church and started many new initiatives.

The Pilgrims groups at St Mark's and All Saints, where you can explore questions of faith in a relaxed atmosphere (not forgetting the delicious cake!) are growing and popular. Thanks to Vanessa's perseverance, playgroups at both churches, Minnows and Sunshine Saints, are now well-established. These groups reach out to new people who do not attend church regularly. Seeing so many of them at St. Mark's fete (one parent even judged the Dog Show!) is evidence of the links these groups are creating. Work with children and families has grown and All Saints now hosts Baddesley Library; further examples of this outreach to the local community.

Whatever is going on at St Mark's, there is Vanessa supporting, helping and organising. Whether it's washing up after Friends for Lunch, chatting to diners at the Lent Lunches or 'pressing the flesh' at the Ampfield Market you can rely on Vanessa. Last year she arrived with new Christmas lights which looked amazing overhead and round the altar area; there she was with Phil amongst the wiring, installing them. She's been to every concert and event we've had in the last four years, and there have been quite a few. At the fete there she is with her camera photographing the people, the dogs and anything else that takes her eye.

Vanessa has taken many baptisms, weddings and funerals, and is a calm and engaging Vicar which helps these occasions to go seamlessly. She is so caring and keen to visit those who are ill or suffering and is well known and respected around the Benefice. Her contributions to The Messenger are always current, relevant and thought provoking.

Vanessa has brought such enthusiasm, energy, vibrancy, and ideas to develop St Marks. She has certainly made her presence felt in a very positive manner. We will miss Vanessa for so many reasons but wish her good luck and success in her new post as Chaplain to Winchester University. The students are in for a treat.

#### Evelyn Earle 1942 - 2025

Born to Shropshire hill farmers, Evelyn Pugh (later Earle) developed a work ethic that ran deeply in her veins along with a connection to God who inhabited all nature around her. The organic world and scientific enquiry piqued Eve's interest further when she became an early patient saved by the new medicine *Penicillin*. Later, Eve's degree in Biology from Cardiff University would inform her successful work as a pig farmer.



After marriage to John, Eve settled in the wilds of Belbins, however Ampfield became Eve's new spiritual home: joining the church opposite her

mother-in-law's house. Her two daughters, Carolyn and Christine, were baptized there; she was a part of the Mothers Union and she rambled through the woods spotting flora and fungi. Although Eve was busy establishing a thriving farm, she always found time to be part of the Ampfield community and in particular help out at the famous fete. She was a part of the fete from the early 1970s right up until 2019!

Once retirement beckoned and her beloved grand-children arrived, Eve's ties with Ampfield became

even stronger. She was a diligent student at church study groups, ran an Ampfield Market stall, helped out in Sunday School, became church warden and was a founding member of the group starting the Over 60s lunches. Eve was a kind, self-deprecating soul with a wicked sense of humour that stayed with her even when words began to fail her. We will miss her deeply but know that she leaves a strong legacy behind her in the lives that she touched and help make a little bit more beautiful.

#### **Eve and Ampfield Market**

Eve was one of the first people we met when we arrived in Ampfield late in 1990. She was always kind, helpful and welcoming. She decided to have a table in the monthly Ampfield Market in October 2001 and started by selling Christmas cards, calendars and Oasis cards to help raise money for St Marks Church.. The following month she added wholefoods to her table.

which included a wide selection of Fairtrade products including coffee, tea and chocolate. I was delighted and so were our customers Eve went to collect the products from the Oasis shop in Romsey on a sale or return basis which meant a huge amount of hard work transporting everything from shop to Market and back every month. Daryl joined Eve in December 2014 and they continued on as a team until September 2019 when Daryl took over until November 2021. Her commitment to this cause for over 20 years was truly remarkable and very much appreciated. When I called in to Oasis with a Market poster last month - they were delighted to help out and still remembered Eve's help over many, many years.


Eve's funeral will take place in St Mark's Church on Thursday, 16 October at 2.30pm. Everyone is welcome.

September is a major holiday month for many of us. It is comfortably away from school holidays but still provides relatively warm days and light evenings. So, it came as little surprise to find that the numbers of our woodland group available to play this past month were

somewhat less than normal. We must tailor our objectives accordingly, although, as ever, our work party will commence with a walk through the wood, clearing the footpaths and collecting any rubbish we can find.

High on the agenda this month was what to do with the bench we took out of commission in August. For health and safety

reasons, it had been decided that it should be removed from the woodland. Nevertheless, it was clear that, with a bit of TLC, and some skill with a saw and a drill, it might be possible to salvage a few more years of service in another environment. Our first job then was to get it in a state whereby it could be moved. Given the legs were well cemented into the ground, we had to think this through carefully. As

is so often in these cases, the more you think about forming a plan, the easier the execution becomes. Within a relatively short period of time the bench was out of the ground, with no visible evidence of its existence

remaining. All that remained was to move it to its new resting place, having first removed the commemorative plaque, which will be displayed elsewhere. All in all, a satisfying example of rehabilitating an otherwise defunct asset.

The other job we wanted to do was to prepare the firepit area for our annual bonfire this coming autumn. Over the summer months, bracken had enjoyed a series of field days. The whole area was swamped. Over the years, we have experienced different methods to get rid of bracken, all of them only successful as a temporary measure, but, for now, that will do. The most straightforward is simply to



pull out the stalks. With three of us on the job, this again proved somewhat more straightforward than expected. The disposal of the plant material will have to wait for another time, we may try to burn it, if the fire is hot enough.

After coffee and cake, we took a walk to the slope behind the church to see how that had faired over the hot, dry summer. Happily, it seems that many of the whips we planted last autumn have survived. It is too early to tell with bulbs, but, fingers crossed. We hope to have further planting sessions over the winter.



If you fancy the idea of joining some like-minded neighbours for a few hours once a month, just turn up in the St. Mark's car park at 09:45 on the second Saturday of every month. The Friends are a good bunch. Tools are provided. It is a good way to have a bit of fun and help our community at the same time.

#### FROM THE ARCHIVES

October 2002

#### OUR GARDEN

It is now mid September and after a spell of dry weather, four days ago, we had rain which washed the faces of the flowers and leaves and brought relief to the parched earth. Today the blue skies returned and we can once more enjoy the sunshine, Susie soaking up the warmth in the wheelbarrow as she snoozes, and Tabitha getting in some serious sleeping, in a fruit tray, in the greenhouse. The sunshine has brought out the butterflies, the coppery orange comma, so named because of the white mark on the underside of each wing; the red admirals with their dark wings marked with red and white and the peacocks with 'eyes' on their predominantly red wings. All feed hungrily on the sedum flowers which they share with numerous bees and hoverflies. The wasps are busily feeding on the fallen apples. Overhead hundreds of rooks make their noisy way to the harvest fields and way above them the local pair of buzzards circle in the thermals with their two youngsters.

In gardening you are never finished and it is a continuous cycle of removing plants and indeed whole beds that have had their day. We are still engaged in clearing the rose beds and last Sunday we took down a small diseased laburnum. When you have replanted, you wonder why you have delayed redevelopment so long. The hardy cyclamen are in full flower, the rosy pink geums nod in the breeze on their long slender stems and the second flush of purple cranesbill flowers glow against their deep cut leaves. The fuschias, begonias and busy lizzies are alight in the bright sunshine and have attracted the first humming bird hawk moth of the year.

Yesterday, Susie was discovered sitting motionless in front of a three feet long grass snake which had frozen, they just sat there staring at one another. At this point I intervened and as the snake made a dash for the bushes I grabbed its tail. Understandably it did not take kindly to this and tried to turn upwards and bite me, making a great deal of hissing and excreting a foul smelling liquid. We eventually managed to get it into a bag and released it beside a nearby stream. This garden of ours is fast becoming a wildlife park.

#### Ride and Stride - Hampshire and the Islands Historic Churches Trust 13th September



We had 2 separate expeditions for Ride and Stride again this year. Francois went round all the churches in Romsey Deanery on his scooter, including Farley Church. Meanwhile a group walked between the four churches in the parish starting from St Denys, walking to All Saints down the old road and then using an obscure back route across scrubland to avoid going along the main road. Going on to St John's by road, we then cut through the corner of Body Farm and Emer Bog to Pound Lane. On down to cross over the A3090 and through Ampfield Wood to St Mark's, then back along the A3090 to the White Horse where some more parishioners joined us for an excellent well earned lunch!

#### Can you identify this plant from St. Mark's churchyard?



In June our contributor asked for help to identify the plant she had found:

"Thank you" to the lady who believes that the small yellow flower in the churchyard is *Potentilla Erecta*. See September issue, p. 12.

According to Mr. Keble Martin (1969) Cinquefoil and tormentil are both common names for different plants but both belong to the large family of Potentilla. Tormentil has the botanical name of *Potentilla Erecta*. Why it was named Erect(a) when it is clearly a creeping plant seems strange.

Mr. Keble Martin (1974 edition) does say that its stem is slender and is supported by other surrounding growth. The illustrated Flora of Britain and Northern Europe, so beautifully painted by Mrs. Marjorie Blamey with text by Mr. Christopher Grey - Wilson (1989) says "Potentilla Erecta (common name Tormentil) is low-growing, patch forming and has downy leaves." In the 'Flowers of the Field' by the Reverend Charles Alexander Johns (1915) it states "A small sub-erect plant six to ten inches high, slender with curly hairs."

This all makes me eager to see Potentilla Erecta in flower again next summer. I had not noticed that the leaves were downy or hairy nor that it was six inches tall! By then I hope to have acquired a new pair of reading glasses.

Throughout history some types of Potentilla have been used for medicinal purposes: to ease toothache and to stop bleeding. The roots were boiled or baked or ground up to make bread or porridge. *Potentella Erecta* is still said to be used in Scotland for treating stomach and digestive problems.
